It was on March 1,2019 a national seminar entitled CON TEXT 2K19 was conducted in our prestigious Providence Women's College which was organised by the Postgraduate Department of English. The college's Mother Veronica Hall witnessed countless students from different colleges, all over India. It was very pleasing for the teachers of English department to see a lot of gatherings from different college. As per the rule of the programme, the registration session started sharp at 9 am and ended at 9:30 am. After registration, the programme got commenced with an inspiring speech by Dr. Sister Ashmitha, the Principal of the college. She spoke about the topic of the day, "Revisiting the Classics". After her speech Ms. Shyama, the head of the department delivered an introductional keynote address. After that one of the student representative, Ms Keerthi N gave a short welcome speech.

Then the integral part of the seminar took place, and that was Dr. Janaki Sreedharan's key note address. She is the professor from The Department of English, University of Calicut. She also mentioned the plight of earlier Indian women writers through the life experiences of the famous Telugu writer and courtesan Muddupalani, who endured harsh criticisms with the publication of her work "Rathika Santwanam". After the keynote address a small tea break was given and after that the paper presentations started on time.

There were almost ten paper presentations and it began at 11:30 am. The first session continued till 1pm. The session was chaired by Ms. CE Ramani, the Associate Professor of English department. The first paper was presented by Doyal Jobin Jacob, student of Providence Women's College, Calicut. Her topic was "Literature in Transformation; a Postmodern Reading of the Novel 'The Lord of the Flies'". The second paper was by Reneeta Anna Robert, MA English and Comparative Literature student from Central University of Kerala, on the topic Paradigmatic Heroism; Campbell's Archetypal Heroes- Bakha and Balram". The third paper was conferred by Arathy Thomas, MA English Literature student from Aloysius College Mangalore, on the topic "Revisiting and Revisioning of King Liar in Jane Smiley's 'A Thousand Acres': Analysis of Changes in the Socio-Cultural Values.

Following the third paper the fourth presentation was made by Gayathri PR, MA English and Comparative Literature student from Central University of Kerala.
